TSIBA Business School, registered as TSIBA Education NPC, is an accredited not-for-profit Higher Education Institution located in Cape Town, South Africa. TSIBA offers unique undergraduate and postgraduate qualifications in business and entrepreneurial leadership.

An early pioneer of access to tertiary education through funded tuition-fee scholarships, TSIBA has offered high quality tertiary level business education to talented and ambitious young Africans since 2004.

Given the stark difference between a national youth unemployment rate above 50% and how this number shrinks to less than 10 % when armed with a tertiary degree, TSIBA has focussed on enabling determined young people who are traditionally excluded to gain access to quality tertiary education and to succeed.

Our Impact

Since inception in 2004, TSIBA has invested in transitioning young people into careers and ethical, purpose-driven leadership. To understand our return on investment we measure four key impact categories:

- **Access to Education**
- **Graduate Employability**
- **Leadership**
- **Academic Throughput**

Access to Education

Why do we measure Access?

- TSIBA subscribes and aspires to the Sustainable Development Goal of Quality Education (SDG 4)
- Most TSIBA students have emerged from Quintile 1 to 3 (secondary) schools, primarily in the Western Cape. Even when they have completed Grade 12 they would not have achieved the exemption necessary to study at university level. Our students are first generation tertiary education students, typically from the demographic of economically marginalised youth. While talented and aspiring to transcend poverty, severely limited opportunities to access tertiary education exist - either through NSFAS (National Student Financial Aid Scheme) to public universities or to other private higher education institutions

What impact has TSIBA achieved?

TSIBA has provided over 9500 full or subsidised annual-tuition scholarships to over 3500 students who otherwise would not have had such an opportunity.

TSIBA has produced 1743 business graduates, including 646 Bachelor of Business of Administration in Entrepreneurial Leadership (BBA) Alumni and 1088 Higher Certificate in Business Administration (HCBA) Alumni.

761 (70% of 1088) HCBA Alumni have progressed to the TSIBA BBA degree, graduated as degree alumni, or remain on course to do so. Access to degree studies to this group would have been highly improbable without the TSIBA HCBA bridging qualification pathway.



TSIBA has grown student numbers from 86 registered for studies in 2008 to over 700 students currently registered . 1000 students in-studies annually is targeted from 2025.

Graduate Employability

Why do we measure Graduate Employability?

- TSIBA subscribes and aspires to the Sustainable Development Goal of No Poverty (SDG 1)
- In a context of over 50% youth unemployment, a primary measure of our raison d'etre is graduate employment and active economic citizenship.
- TSIBA measures Graduate Employment across a range of dimensions, including employment, remuneration, mobility, consistency, industry sector and economic contribution.



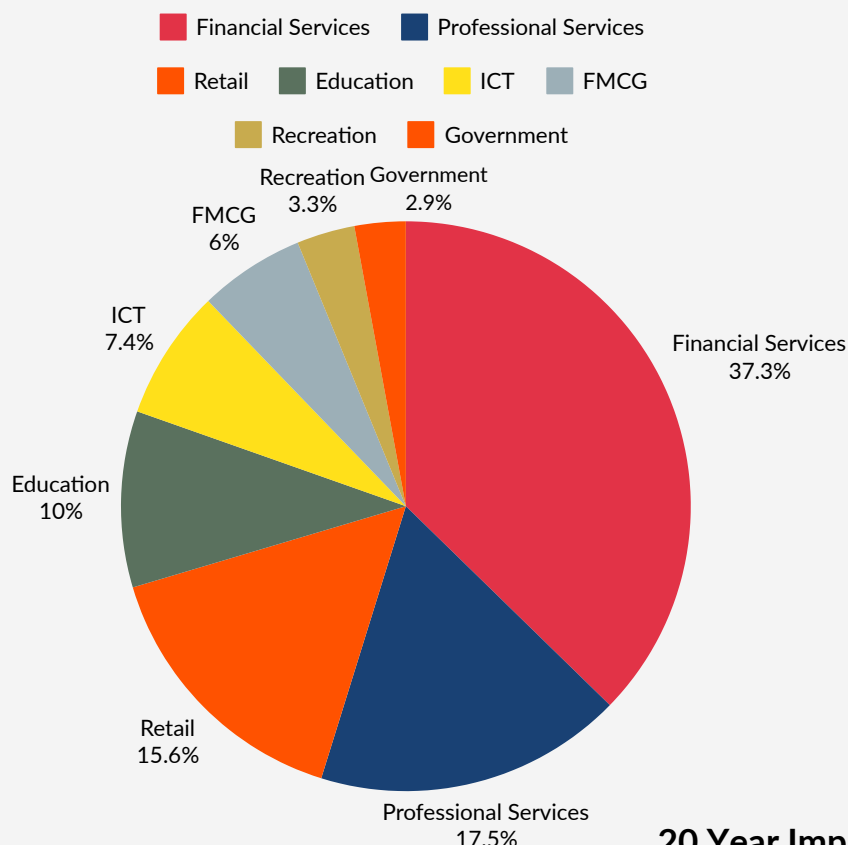
What impact has TSIBA achieved?

- TSIBA has maintained a post-graduate employment rate of above 90% for our BBA Degree Alumni since inception.

A TSIBA Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) Degree graduate survey conducted in 2023 found the following with specific reference to our graduate employment rate:

- **First employment remuneration:** First-Employment (average) monthly earnings greater than R8000 places TSIBA BBA Alumni in the middle 40% of per-adult household income earners in South Africa, and above 50% of South African income earners.
- **Average remuneration:** The current average per-month earnings of R 14 668 places TSIBA BBA Alumni in the top 18% of earners in South Africa ([2022 Business Tech Report](#)).
- **Remuneration mobility:** 31% of TSIBA BBA Alumni respondents to the 2023 graduate survey earn above ZAR 30 000 per month (or ZAR 360 000 per annum). At this level of remuneration, these (TSIBA) Graduates are in the top 50% of South African income earners ([Salary Explorer](#))
- **Employment rapidity:** In a measure of employment rapidity, 88% of TSIBA BBA graduates have achieved employment within 12 months of completion of studies at TSIBA, the majority of whom have gained employment with the host organisation with whom the TSIBA third-year internship was completed.

What impact has TSIBA achieved?

- **Employment consistency:** In a measure of employment consistency, over 68% of TSIBA graduates have remained in employment 75% of the time since graduation.
- **Financial sector employment:** The majority of TSIBA BBA graduates remain employed in the financial services sector, with many of these having completed the ASISA Investment Management Course (IMAC) as a second-year elective course.
- **Qualification relevance** - Data supporting the relevance of the Higher Certificate and Bachelor of Business Administration qualifications offered by TSIBA is affirming. Recent data in two separate reports through (BUSINESS TECH) and (BUSINESS TECH) indicates business administration and management amongst the most in-demand jobs in South Africa currently in light of an increase in overall hiring activity. TSIBA continues to track skills demands and curriculum content to optimise graduate opportunities in the workplace.
- **Economic contribution:** Calculated over the lifespan of TSIBA BBA graduates will earn over ZAR300 Million as active tax-paying economic citizens.

Why do we measure Leadership?

- Access to education is necessary, but not sufficient. Ultimately, education must act as a catalyst for the best of what people can be.
- At TSIBA, the core subjects which underpin excellent business education are necessary and provided in full, but we go beyond. The subject of Leadership sits at the heart of all of our curricula. We measure Leadership to assess our impact in this important element of a TSIBA education.

Academic Throughput

Why do we measure Throughput?

- Significant investment in funding TSIBA requires the creation of a learning environment capable of student retention, progression and maximising return on investment.
- As a registered higher education institution TSIBA has a legal requirement to do so.

What impact has TSIBA achieved?

- Notwithstanding the education deficit with which many students start, TSIBA has consistently produced throughput rates in excess of 50% across our certificate and degree programmes. TSIBA throughput rates compare favourably with a South African national average rate lower than 50% across all programmes.
